## Dr. Charlene Moore Cooper (b. 1938)

Charlene Moore Cooper (born 1938) is a Baltimore native with a distinguished career in music and education. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree in flute and music education from Oberlin Conservatory and received a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from Catholic University in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Cooper taught music in both the Baltimore and Washington, D.C. public schools and instructed liturgy courses at Howard University's School of Divinity. Her directorial roles included leading the Municipal Opera of Baltimore, the NAACP

Community Choir, the Best Friends Jazz Choir, and serving as Director of Music for John Wesley A.M.E. Zion Church in Washington. Cooper's compositional work spans multiple genres, including organ, piano, voice, chorus, chamber ensemble, and orchestra. Her piece, A Solitary Prayer, was initially conceived as a tribute to her late mother.

A common misconception about African American classical music is that it solely draws from Negro Spiritual themes and folk songs. Although many works do indeed originate from these sources, others reflect broader social changes throughout Black history. Moreover, African American composers were influenced not only by their own cultural heritage but also by the evolving styles and periods that characterized music history as a whole. The compositions of African Americans, particularly those writing for the organ, are rooted in a diverse array of influences. These include not only spirituals but also plainchant, general Protestant hymnody, German chorale tunes, themes of African origin, and original themes.
